WELCOME TO WISCONSIN

Located on an isthmus formed by two lakes, Wisconsin's Capitol lies at the heart of the city of Madison and is its commanding feature. The Capitol is an example of Roman Renaissance architecture. The exterior is made of blocks of Bethel Vermont granite. Interior building materials were carefully selected and many fine pieces of marble and granite were imported from France, Norway, Italy, Algeria and Germany. Construction of the Capitol took 10 years and was completed in 1917.

The height of the Capitol from the ground to the top of the statue "Forward" on the dome is 285.9 feet. It was intentionally designed to be seven inches shorter than the United States Capitol in Washington, D.C.

Free tours are held seven days a week. Visitors are welcome.
